
A WIDER CIRCLE 2021 Year in Review

2021 was a big year for A Wider Circle — we celebrated 20 years of service; Partnership to Independence, our long-term support program, celebrated its third anniversary; and we completed two major construction projects with the renovation of our Silver Spring Center and the build-out of our Ward 8 Hub in Southeast DC. Plus, we opened our doors for the first time since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, inviting clients, donors, and volunteers back into our centers after many months of contactless and remote services.

On top of it all, our core programs continued to do what they do best: turning thousands of apartments into comfortable, welcoming homes; giving hundreds of job seekers the guidance, tools, and support they needed to navigate the path to financial self-sufficiency; and empowering residents in DC's Washington Highlands neighborhood to work toward building a community that is safe, healthy, and full of opportunity.

Though we served thousands in 2021, there is still so much work to be done to ensure everyone in our region has the opportunity to live a life of dignity and stability. For many years, our Workforce Development Program has provided holistic support to job seekers. Then, in 2020, life became increasingly isolated, and we saw the need for even greater connection and deeper, more individualized support. To meet this need, we expanded our long-term job readiness programming in 2021, including hiring a full-time Career Counselor to work one-on-one with job seekers as they worked towards their unique goals. In addition to a deepened level of engagement, job seekers joined the Workforce Development team and volunteer experts from across different industries for virtual workshops and networking events and continued to visit our Professional Development Center to receive the attire needed for that first impression and beyond.

Funded by our microgrants program, BOLD Babies was a series of weekly classes held for parents in the community. Families practiced parenting skills, worked on enhancing their child's growth and development, and were connected to resources in the community.

Based at our Ward 8 Hub in Southeast DC, the Neighborhood Partnerships Program works with residents to address needs specific to their community, providing services including health and wellness programming, career counseling, community empowerment, and more. We also saw the launch of our first-ever microgrants program in 2021, through which 12 local leaders, entrepreneurs, and community groups received grants of \$250-\$2,500 to fund projects that directly benefited the neighborhood. While we provided the funding, the final grant selections rested with residents themselves. Programs that were funded included weekly parenting classes, substance abuse support groups, and the purchase of school uniforms for nearly two dozen students returning to the classroom.


P2I participants and their families joined our team in October to celebrate the program's three-year anniversary.

In 2021, we celebrated the third anniversary of our five-year long-term support program, Partnership to Independence (P2I). Our cohort of 16 participants receives long-term comprehensive support, working closely with staff Advocates and trained volunteers to identify their unique needs and goals, creating a road map to self-sufficiency. Milestones in 2021 included 13 participants sustaining emergency savings accounts and 8 participants increasing their household income. Other successes included participants getting promotions or new jobs, securing stable housing, and enrolling in or completing higher education.

A project many years in the making, the renovation of A Wider Circle's Ann and Don Brown Center for Community Service was fully completed in the summer of 2021. All parts of the building, once divided into four separate units, are now connected from end-to-end, allowing a cohesive experience for those who come to us, and making it easier for staff and volunteers to provide services. There is now nearly triple the amount of space for services, the space is completely ADA compliant, and the design of the Center is trauma-informed, ensuring comfort and support for all who visit. We are incredibly grateful to the team at Donohoe Construction for leading the project and seeing the renovations to their completion.





Our Ward 8 Hub




Residents of the Washington Highlands neighborhood joined us to celebrate the Grand Opening of our Ward 8 Hub.


In early 2018, the DC Housing Authority offered us 2,700 square feet of storefront space to use on the ground floor of the Highland-24 building in the Highland Dwellings community. The only stipulation was that the inside of the space needed to be completely built out. With the help of AvalonBay Communities, construction was completed in the summer of 2021, with the Grand Opening of our Ward 8 Hub celebrated in September.

From the Ward 8 Hub, we offer direct services including programming on health and wellness, short and long term family support, career counseling, and financial management. We also offer space at the Hub to partners and other groups, creating greater access to services in the community. We are excited for this new space to be a place of collaboration, connection, and impact for the local community.
















Special Initiatives


Bed and Desk Distributions

In November of 2021, we partnered with Montgomery County Public Schools Down County Consortium to host two bed and desk distribution events.

Helping Refugees from Afghanistan

In partnership with local refugee resettlement agencies, including Lutheran Social Services and Homes Not Borders, we helped set up homes for refugee families from Afghanistan. As a result, 20 families — more than 100 of our newest neighbors — were able to settle into fully furnished homes after arriving to the region.
